

BUILDING PERMITS

You will be fined \$100.00 plus double the cost of the Building Permit if you start work without obtaining a Building Permit. NO EXCEPTIONS.



A building permit must be obtained prior to the construction, alteration/remodel or repair of any house/property whether

doing the work yourself or by a contractor. Permits are needed for, but not limited to, the following: alterations involving moving or adding walls, basement finish-out, electrical and plumbing work, HVAC work, shed, fence, deck, patio, roof, driveway, window replacement, siding, solar panels, swimming pool. If you're not sure if a permit is required, please call the Village Office at 708-788-3429. Some building permits require a fee, however for many projects, there is no fee at all for the permit.

Permits are required to ensure that the work adheres to Forest View Building Codes. Also permits can guarantee that a contractor is insured and bonded and the homeowner is protected from fraud.

Before You Dig, Call (or Click) JULIE

If you are planning an outdoor project, call JULIE before you dig to avoid injury and/or damage to underground utilities. Simply call 811 or 1-800-892-0123. The call is free and so are the services. Call center representatives are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Or you can log on to www.illinois1call.com and click e-request to enter your request.

COMPOST

Compost pick up started 04-03-24. If using a garbage can for compost, you must place a compost sticker on the can. Stickers are available at the Village Office. Biodegradable bags do not require a sticker.

ORDINANCE REMINDER

Per Village Ordinance Chapter 2, Section 9-2-3, Vehicles blocking sidewalks 2 feet or more will be ticketed. Please do not block the sidewalk.

Additionally, please make sure you or your guests do not drive up on the curb and park your vehicle on the courtesy walk. The courtesy walk is there for convenience when parking on the street. Any vehicle parked on the courtesy walk will be ticketed.

GARAGE SALES

Spring/summer cleaning in many cases means garage sales.



Just as a reminder, sales are limited to two (2) per household per year. There is no fee to hold a sale, but a permit is required. Permits should be obtained at the Village Office three (3) days prior to the planned sale. Sale hours are limited between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. and sales cannot last more than three (3) consecutive days. Regular items found around the house are allowable in garage sales; however, arts and craft items are not. All advertisements must be removed from the parkway within 24 hours of the completion of the sale, and at no time are signs to be placed on street light poles, stop signs or parking signs.



ANNUAL DOG LICENSE/TAG




We would like to take this opportunity to remind all residents our Village Ordinance requires that <u>all</u> dogs be licensed annually with the Village Office and wear an up-to-date dog identification tag. To make it not only <u>easier to remember</u> but also

more *convenient* to do so, 2024-2025 dog license/identification tag(s) should be purchased along with the purchase of your vehicle sticker(s) in the month of June per Village Code. One stop! So please look for Dog License Registration form(s) along with Vehicle Sticker Application(s) in your mailbox around June 3rd. To obtain a license, owners should bring registration form and must show proof of a current rabies vaccination to the Village Office. The dog license/identification tag is only \$1.00. Dog identification registration tags are helpful to the pet owner should the dog get lost. As a reminder, per Village Code, no more than three (3) dogs are allowed per residence. Don't be subject to a \$50.00 citation, please remember to purchase your dog license(s) this June...and every June thereafter!

PUBLIC WORKS

YARD WASTE

Yard waste pick-up has officially begun on Wednesday, April 3rd. Grass, branches, leaves, and other natural waste can be put into brown yard waste bags or into containers not exceeding 35-gallon size with a COMPOST ONLY sticker on the container. BIODEGRADABLE YARD BAGS DO NOT NEED A STICKER. PLASTIC BAGS ARE NOT ACCEPTED. If you need stickers for a container, they are available free of charge in the Village Office.

LAWN MAINTENANCE

Homeowners can help keep our community neat and attractive by regularly mowing their lawns. Please do not

mow/divert the grass into the street as it will clog up the sewer system. Please make sure your landscaping company does NOT divert the grass into the street. Forest View Village Code requires that grass/weeds be maintained at a height of five inches (5") or less. Grass/weeds that are neglected and allowed to grow longer than 5 inches is considered a nuisance and the Public Works crew may cut and bill property owner or lessee \$150.00 for the 1st cutting and \$325.00 for subsequent cuttings during the same calendar year. Please be considerate of your neighbors and community by keeping your lawn mowed.

PARKWAY TREES



Remember, trees that are located on the parkway belong to the Village and cannot be cut or trimmed by residents. If you have a

concern about a tree on your parkway, please contact the Public Works Department at 708-788-3429.

STREET SWEEPER:

Keep an eye out for our new sweeper!

Although we do not have parking restrictions for sweeper days, if you notice the sweeper is out, please try to keep cars off the street until the sweeper has finished your block.



UPCOMING PROJECTS

Wenonah Sewer Project: This project includes installing a new sewer line from the dead-end of Wenonah south under the tracks, then west to Harlem. Once completed it should alleviate some of the flooding during heavy rainfalls.

STREET PAVING

This year we will be paving 4 streets.

Please be mindful of signage, parking restrictions, and workers during construction. More info will be passed out when we have an official project start date.

TICKET FINES

Please watch your speed in town. Ordinance 23-14 has been approved to protect the Forest View residents from speeders through town. The fine for speeding will be \$250.00. The fine for speeding 26 miles per hour or over will be \$500.00. Keeping our residents safe is our number one priority. These fines will be enforced through our park and school zones.

SPEED BUMPS

Due to the excessive speeding through town, the Department Heads with Board approval, have implemented the use of speed bumps through various streets in Forest View.

SOLICITORS

As the weather breaks, look out for home repair scams and fraud. Remember, door-to-door solicitors must first obtain a Solicitor's Badge from the Police Department that must be worn around their neck. Please note that just because a solicitor is wearing a badge does not mean the Village sanctions the product or solicitation cause. Solicitors may operate only Monday - Saturday between the hours of 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. and are not allowed on Sundays or holidays. "NO SOLICITORS" decals are available at the Village Office free of charge. Please report any solicitation without a badge or during non-soliciting hours or disregard of posted "NO SOLICITORS" decal to the Police Department at non-emergency number 708-788-0318.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK PROGRAM



We are happy to inform you that we now have a locked prescription drug drop box. The box is located in the Village Hall next to the Police Department. Please remove personal labels and thank you for participating in the Prescription Drug Take Back Program.

As we welcome spring, we change our clocks forward, please remember to also change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Your detectors are only good for a ten-year life span. If you are not sure how old your detector is, you may want to replace it.

One last thing to keep in mind, if you have a medical alert system or a residential fire alarm system, we have the Knox Box System in place here in the Village. This system is a secured steel box that hangs on your door and allows us access to your home in the event of an emergency without causing entry damage. Once the emergency is over, we can re-secure your home. If you have any questions, please contact me at the station to discuss the system.

The Village has a tornado siren which is tested the first Tuesday of every month at 10:00 a.m. The siren wails for one (1) minute. If you hear the siren at other times, it is a warning that a tornado has been sited and may be headed towards our Village. If this happens, you should move to a safe place.

Although tornadoes can occur at any time of the year, they most frequently occur in spring and summer. By reviewing the following basic tornado safety points, you will be better prepared to protect yourself and minimize chance of injury:

- Remain inside go quickly to a safe area <u>away</u> from windows, doors, corners and outside walls. The basement is a safe place; if none, go to <u>lowest-level</u>, <u>interior room</u>, with <u>NO windows</u> (such as closet, bathroom, or interior hallway).
- Listen to the radio or TV for severe weather alerts and updates. Keep a battery-operated radio.
- Be aware of flying debris. Crouch down under a heavy/sturdy piece of furniture such as a table, bend over, and cover your head and neck with your arms and use pillows, cushions, or any other cushioning materials.
- If you are in a car, get out right away. Get inside a sturdy building.
- If you are outside and cannot get inside, lie flat in a ditch or another low-lying area. Cover your head with your arms.

Drinking Coffee May Reduce the Risk of Neurologic Disease

Most Americans—62 percent—love their morning cup of coffee or afternoon pick-me-up, according to a 2022 study by the National Coffee Association. And some of them may wonder about the health benefits. In fact, new research suggests it may be good for the brain, says Marilyn C. Cornelis, PhD. So far, most research shows a link between coffee consumption and a reduced risk of disease but no clear cause and effect.

In particular, studies indicate that coffee is associated with a lower risk of Alzheimer's disease, multiple sclerosis (MS), Parkinson's disease, and stroke. Its relationship to migraine is more complex, but for some people coffee is linked to fewer attacks, says William B. Young, MD, FAAN.

Several studies looking at Alzheimer's showed a link between consuming coffee and a reduced risk of the disease. A 2021 study published in Frontiers in Aging *Neuroscience* found a connection between drinking more coffee and a slower cognitive decline and less accumulation of beta amyloid, a marker of Alzheimer's disease. In another study, published in the Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry in 2023, researchers looked at espresso in lab tests and found that the ingredients could potentially stop the clumping of tau proteins linked to Alzheimer's disease. Adding coffee to tau proteins in test tubes appeared to prevent the formation of structures associated with memory loss. In a third study, published in *Annals of Neurology* in 2022, caffeine intake correlated with lower levels of Lewy bodies in the brain, says Dr. Cornelis. Lewy body dementia is characterized by abnormal deposits of alpha-synuclein, a protein in the brain. "The result suggests that coffee may have an impact on a specific type of dementia," she says. To learn more about the link between coffee and Parkinson's disease, a researcher at the National Food and Nutrition Institute in Warsaw, Poland, conducted a meta-analysis of 90 coffee-related studies. The results, published in Archives of Medical Science in 2017, found that men who drank at least one cup of coffee a day had a lower risk of dying from Parkinson's than those who abstained. In addition, male coffee drinkers had a 30 percent lower risk of developing the disease than nondrinkers.

The research on coffee's effect on MS suggests that it may lower the risk of developing the disorder. A study published in the *Journal of Neurology, Neurosurgery and Psychiatry* in 2016 found that people who didn't drink coffee were about one and a half times as likely to develop MS as those who drank four or more cups of coffee per day. A meta-analysis in 2018 in *Frontiers in Nutrition* concluded that coffee and especially caffeine in high doses might have a preventive effect on MS.

Evidence for caffeine's potential role in reducing the risk of stroke comes from a study in *PLOS Medicine* in 2021. Researchers followed 365,682 participants from the UK Biobank, an extensive database and resource for researchers, from 2006 to 2020 and concluded that drinking coffee and tea separately or in combination was associated with a 32 percent lower risk of stroke.

For some people with migraine, caffeine can ease pain in the early stages of an attack. For others, it can trigger a headache or aggravate symptoms, says Dr. Young. Caffeine, which has long been an ingredient in over-the-counter pain relievers, is known to narrow blood vessels. During a headache or migraine, blood vessels in the brain may dilate or widen, which contributes to increased blood flow and pressure in the head that can cause pain. Medications that narrow these blood vessels reduce blood flow and can alleviate the associated pain.

People who regularly consume caffeine may become dependent. If they stop completely, they may experience withdrawal, which can trigger headaches. Dr. Young recommends that people pay attention to their bodies' responses to caffeine or talk to a health care professional about whether to start or stop drinking coffee or other caffeinated beverages.

Researchers are still trying to understand how coffee may protect against some neurologic disorders. Its high caffeine content is one clue, says Sandra Weintraub, PhD. When absorbed in the bloodstream, caffeine travels to the brain, where it blocks the action of adenosine, a neurotransmitter responsible for promoting sleep and relaxation, according to a 2021 study published in *Cureus*. This leads to increased levels of other neurotransmitters like dopamine (a "feel good" messenger) and norepinephrine (the brain's "fight or flight" messenger), which temporarily provide an energy boost and mental alertness.

Despite coffee's potential protective effects, consuming caffeine should be an individual decision, says Dr. Weintraub. "Everybody's looking for the one health tip, like 'If I eat more blueberries' or 'If I exercise this particular way,' that will be the secret to a long, healthy life," she says. "The research can help guide us, but you also have to think about your own body."

Tolerance to caffeine varies, and some people may be more sensitive to its effects, which can include insomnia, jitteriness, increased heart rate, digestive trouble, and in some cases anxiety, according to the U.S. FDA. People who are pregnant or have certain health conditions, such as insomnia and sleep disorders, anxiety disorders, or gastrointestinal or cardiovascular issues, should talk to their doctors to determine an appropriate level of caffeine intake.

The general rule is to pay attention to how your body responds to caffeine and adjust your intake accordingly.



STICKNEY TOWNSHIP ANIMAL CONTROL....

RODENT/WILDLIFE CONTROL

To deter unwanted critters, following are guidelines recommended and provided by Stickney Township Environmental Health Department:

Notify the Environmental Health Department if you Notice Rodent or Wildlife Activity on your Property.

Burrows and tracks are signs of rodents in your yard.

Starve rats and wildlife out.

Remove pet foods and water immediately after feeding. Remove dog feces on your property, this is a source of food for rats. Don't put out food for squirrels or birds. Keep garbage in sound containers with tight-fitting lids, this lessens the chance of wildlife disturbance. Plastic bags alone are not enough. Rats can't eat what they can't get to.

Keep animals out.

Seal all openings in your home, garage, or shed larger than ½ inch in diameter. Block openings under decks, elevated sheds, concrete slabs and porches. Secure outside access to crawl spaces and repair broken, weak or rotted areas on your roof, soffit and fascia.

Eliminate rat and wildlife hiding places. Remove all unused items, car parts, junk, debris, and building materials from around the yard and don't forget to keep the grass short and bushes trimmed.

Use poison and rat traps.

The Stickney Township Environmental Health Department can provide assistance in setting traps and bait stations provided by the township. For further information or assistance, call the Environmental Health Department at

Stickney Township does not pick up dead animals on private property either with the exception of domestic animals, e.g. dogs and cats so they can be scanned. They will, however, pick-up injured or sick looking animals.

The Stickney Township Animal Control Department has advised the Village that raccoons right now are coming down with distemper. They advise residents to keep their dogs up-to-date on their distemper and rabies shots.

PLEASE NOTE: The Public Works Department will only pick-up dead animals located on a Village street, sidewalk, or parkway. It is the responsibility of property owners to collect a dead animal on their own property. It is suggested to wear gloves and use double bags when doing so and dispose in garbage tote.




LAUGH OUT LOUD

November 14, 2023

Village Administrator Dropka is requesting Board approval to amend Ordinance No. 23-14, Section 9-3-1 of the Forest View Village Code "Speed Restrictions," in school and park zones in the village, clearly define those areas and increase the penalties for speeding in those areas.

We had 6 houses participate in the Halloween Home Decorating contest. All of the homes looked beautiful.

Superintendent Filec reported that Riccio Construction is working on the scheduled 2023-2024 excavations at Forest View Terminal Drive.

Our IEPA Inspection for the water system is scheduled for the end of the month.

Concrete has been poured for the Salt Dome.

November 28, 2023

President Miller is requesting the Board approve Resolution No. R 23-17 honoring long-term resident Anthony Faikus, Jr. on his hundredth (100th) birthday.

Superintendent Filec reported Metropolitan Industries has been working at our pumphouse regarding the switchover to our new SCADA system.

Our EPA inspection which is done every three years, will take place November 15, 2023.

Novotny Engineering and Bulk Storage are moving on pace and hope to get the Salt Dome storage bin completed before Spring.

President Miller asked the Board if we could honor Mrs. Elizabeth Marbes who was a big part of our village. She was an Election Judge and Police Commissioner. It was agreed to name the Board Room after Mrs. Elizabeth Marbes.

December 12, 2023

Village Administrator Dropka is working with the Village Attorney on putting together the Special Service Area tax on the businesses around Central and 47th Street. The additional tax dollars would go into the water and sewer fund to help pay for any issues that occur with the newly acquired sewer lines.

Police Chief Zarate reported that three (3) Flock Cameras have been installed in the Village. The Police Department is getting live information online, plate reads and additional information needed for the Village to be secure. We are waiting for IDOT to approve one more camera to be installed on Terminal Drive.



January 9, 2024

Village Administrator Dropka requested that the Board authorize the Village Engineer to prepare an application and continue to seek funding for roadway improvements on 46th Street from Harlem Avenue to Oak Park Ave.

The Business Christmas Party on December 13th, 2023 was a nice event giving the business owners a chance to get together and meet with each other.

We have been having routine Centennial Planning Committee meetings and things are progressing.

Village Administrator Dropka has been in contact with MWRD regarding the ongoing levee project. MWRD has finalized the scope of work with their consultant, they expect that the remaining work on the levee should begin this summer.

The Christmas House decorating contest had nine entries. The First-Place Winner was 4500 Maple; the Second-Place Winner was 4603 Clinton; and Third-Place Winner was 4608 Maple. Judging was done by a fireman, a policeman, and a resident during the week of Christmas. The winners received a Christmas gift package which included a gift card for Shell.

January 23, 2024



Park Monitor Seasonal Part-Time Position

Overview:

Park Monitors are the eyes and ears of the park. Their primary responsibility is to ensure the safety and well-being of all of the park's guests as well as provide assistance and guidance where needed. Park Monitors are to assist in monitoring that the Park rules and ordinances are being observed for the safety of all guests.

Position Details/Duties:

Monitors are responsible for observing guests and providing general park information and direction Responsible for instructional safety tips. Monitors observe and assist guests as they enjoy the park, ensuring that guests are using equipment properly and safely. Monitors observe that guests are following the Park's rules and ordinances. Monitors perform daily visual inspections of playground equipment and bathrooms, reporting general problems to the Board and/or the Park Commissioner working with the Monitors. Monitors are responsible for reminding guests to enjoy the Park in a safe manner. Park Monitors work with Police, when needed, and answer to one or more Park Commissioners.

Requirements:

Must have attention to detail and dedication to safety Park monitor must possess a friendly disposition and professional demeanor at all times; a passion for working outdoors and be able to handle all weather conditions Must have regular weekend availability; ideal candidates will also have flexible weekday availability and be able to commit to the full season (spring-summerfall). Must be reliable with strong work ethic and personal integrity Monitors must be able to quickly and competently pick up new skill sets both in training and on the job while maintaining the highest quality standards of performance Must have strong communication skills and patient approach to working with people. Candidates should be able to work on their feet for several hours at a time. Candidates should have some prior customer service work experience. There is a mandatory paid training session required of all candidates. Candidates must be 21+, able to stand on concrete/asphalt, lift up to 20 lbs, and communicate effectively via phone, email, and sms.

Schedule:

This is a part-time, seasonal position. Candidates should have a flexible schedule with both weekday/evening and weekend availability. Monitors should reside within a 10 mile radius of the Forest View Park District.

PLEASE NOTE:

This position requires mandatory training which includes visits to Fire and Police Stations adjacent park property. A finalized schedule will be provided to candidates once they have been hired.
