Toys For Tots Motorcycle Run/Parade Dec.4th, 2022

This was my first time attending and I was honored to participate in this event. I have seen the donation boxes in various stores and saw a 15 second clip on evening news in the past years. Ways to Stay Healthier Into Old Age

Findings from multiple studies on cognitive health and aging suggest that six key lifestyle factors can influence longevity. "Are these six habits going to prevent all disease? No," says Ronald C. Petersen, MD, PhD, FAAN, who is director of the Mayo Clinic Alzheimer's Disease Research Center in Rochester, MN, and serves on the Global Council on Brain Health, an initiative cofounded by AARP. "But if some of these modifications can push back the threshold at which you're going to be cognitively impaired from, say, 72 to 74 or 78, that's a big deal."

Keep moving. Aim for 150 minutes of exercise a week, preferably at a brisk pace. Including some resistance exercises, such as push-ups and planks, to strengthen muscles is a plus.

Engage your mind. Do whatever you enjoy that keeps your mind active, whether it's reading, playing games, doing crossword puzzles, or something else that requires focus, Dr. Petersen advises. If it seems like a chore, it may be hard to stick with, he adds.

Eat more whole foods. A heart-healthy diet doubles as a brain-healthy diet, Dr. Petersen says. Avoid processed foods; eat more fruits, vegetables, grains, and nuts; limit red meat; and don't overdo sweets and alcohol. "Maybe one glass of wine a day," Dr. Petersen says.

Be a social butterfly. As people get older, they tend to stay home more, which can lead to social isolation. "They start to lose their sense of confidence," says Dr. Petersen, and may find reasons not to interact with others. Do all you can to remain engaged with friends, family, and your community.

Find ways to reduce stress. There are many ways to manage stress, including deep breathing, meditation, exercise, and talk therapy. "A little bit of stress can be good, but too much is harmful," says Dr. Petersen.

Village President Nancy L. Miller has been very busy attending some wonderful events while meeting and working together with some amazing people.



REMEMBER WHEN....

The Blizzard of 1967

On January 26–27, 1967, Chicago experienced its worst snowstorm on record. The snow began at 5:02 a.m. on Thursday, January 26, and by 10:10 a.m. the next day, a record 23.0 inches of snowfall from a storm blanketed the city. High winds caused considerable blowing, with drifts of 4 to 6 feet widespread throughout the area.

Just two days before the storm, the high temperature was a record 65°F, and the low was 44°F. But on January 25, a cold front moved through the upper Midwest, replacing the balmy temperatures. Dew points in the 50s–60s over the Southern Plains and Gulf Coast states provided ample moisture, while high pressure centered over Lake Superior and southern Ontario kept cold dry air moving over the Great Lakes. That high pressure along with low pressure over the Ohio Valley caused winds to howl off Lake Michigan.

By noon, about 8 inches of snow was already on the ground, and O'Hare airport was shut down. Some schools and businesses released students and employees early, but the commute home was still treacherous. By Friday morning, Chicago was at a standstill—20,000 cars and 1,100 CTA buses were stranded. Helicopters delivered medical supplies to hospitals as well as food and blankets to stranded motorists. At least a dozen babies were born at home, though some expectant mothers were taken to hospitals by sled, bulldozer, and snowplow.

By January 28, Chicago had begun to dig itself out. Although CTA buses were operating most lines, abandoned vehicles hampered cleanup, and snow had to be hauled by dump truck to the Chicago River. Railcars of snow were even delivered to Fort Myers Beach, Florida, after 13-year-old Terri Hodson wrote a letter to the President of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad, having never seen snow before.

O'Hare finally reopened around midnight on Monday, January 30, but most schools didn't reopen until Tuesday. In the end, 60 people in the Chicago area died, and there was an estimated \$150 million in business losses (equivalent to \$1.19 billion today). The snowstorm was likely the biggest disruption to the commerce and transportation of Chicago of any event since the 1871 Great Chicago Fire.

IF we have a snowy winter, remember the blizzard of '67. Don't plow or shovel. Be a kid again and make forts and tunnels. Look for the beauty that nature can bring. Don't let it inconvenience you, embrace it with your inner child. Accept the two feet of snow because there is not a darn thing you can do about it.

Comments from those who lived through it.....

It was one of the best "Snow Days" a kid could ask for!

My best friend lived on Cornelia at the Addison ramp to the Kennedy expressway. Cars were stalled all over the Kennedy in both directions, but the ramp was clear. It made the best sledding hill!

Lived right next to the Kennedy expressway and we were walking out in the middle of it through the snow. No traffic. Very cool experience, no pun.

Someone that I know was climbing and jumping from one snowdrift buried car to the next, until he fell through into one of them. It turned out to be a snow-buried convertible parked along Lawndale near Cortland. When the owner discovered it, he probably thought the weight of the snow had done it. Lol!

We lived in Oak Forest at the time. My dad went out and bought two snowmobiles so we could get groceries for people in the neighborhood who were stranded. I was 11 years old at the time. I just remember, as kids, we had so much fun playing in the snow and riding the snowmobile. My dad would tow us behind the snowmobile on sleds. Best winter of my life!

We lived in Lombard on St. Charles road. I was 10 yrs. old and somehow me, my 8 yr old brother and toddler sister Patty were home alone. Both parents stuck at work for almost 2 days. My Uncle Don who lived blocks away from us had to trudge through the snow and carry us and the baby back to his house. We had a blast staying at my cousin's. It's a very fun memory.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

Garbage and recycling collection will remain the same through the Holidays. Christmas trees will also be collected during regular refuse removal. Trees must be placed at the curb and free of any decorations.

November 30, 2022 was the last compost pickup.

During the winter season, it would be helpful to place garbage cans behind the curb line – not in the street, so the snow plows can effectively clear the streets.

SENIOR CITIZEN EXEMPTION

If you turned <u>65 years of age</u> during the tax year for which you are applying, remember you must complete the Senior Citizen Exemption application in order to receive reduction/savings.

If you have applied for a Senior Citizen Exemption in the past, that will roll over. Senior Citizen Freeze will need to be re-applied for annually.

"HEADS" UP

On occasion, a resident will come to the Village Office and maintain their water bill is "never that high". Immediately, the first thing that is checked is the flushing mechanism inside the toilet water tank. Frequently it reveals the rubber flap or cone is hung-up or did not "seat" properly and allowed the water to flow continuously. As a result, considerable water usage occurred without the resident's awareness, thus the high bill. Consequently, it pays to exercise a "heads" up for faint water flow sounds.



The Forest View Police Department will be conducting its first ever "Citizens Police Academy" this January. The class will meet one night a week for ten weeks. Participants will learn what it takes to be a law enforcement officer in today's society. Participants must be a resident or business owner of the Village of Forest View. POLICE DEPARTMENT

LEAVING HOME DURING THE HOLIDAYS???

Just a reminder, the Forest View Police Department offers free house security checks if you're leaving town over the holidays. Please contact the Police Department at the nonemergency number 708-788-0318 for more information.

HOLIDAY GUESTS - PARKING

Parking on some streets in Forest View is "residential only". Therefore, should you have guests gathering at your home for the holidays please notify the Police Department at the nonemergency number 708-788-0318 when a nonresident visitor(s) will be parking on the street and then the vehicle(s) will not be ticketed. A parking pass is also available for your guests through the Police Department or Village Office. Also, residents are reminded that overnight parking on Village streets is prohibited. All vehicles must be off the street between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. This allows the Police Department to quickly notice suspicious vehicles in your area. On the occasion that you have overnight guests or work being done on your driveway, permission to park on the street can be received by calling the Police Department.

HOLIDAY CRIME



Holidays are the easiest times for burglars to score. Once the house is empty, criminals know that you will be gone for hours, and that they don't have to rush to take all your precious property. Many burglaries occur on holidays such as Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the best one, believe it or not, is the Super Bowl. If you're not home when the game begins, you're probably not coming back until the game ends! Sad but true. See following holiday safety tips.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holidays are a special and joyous time of year. Taking a few prevention measures can help keep your holiday season joyous. The following tips from the Forest View Police Department can help reduce your chances of becoming a victim of crime:

Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, garage, or vehicle even for a few minutes.

When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house, shovel snow, pick up the mail and newspapers. Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.

Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.

Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.

Don't post travel plans on Facebook.

While on vacation, don't post vacation pictures on Facebook.

WINTER DRIVING

Winter is upon us again and the Police
Department would just like to remind residents
to take due caution driving during the winter
months. Remember stopping on snow and ice
is very hazardous, so slow your speed on snow
covered streets and watch for the infamous
black ice. Keep a greater distance between
your vehicle and the one in front of you. If
you're driving an all-wheel or 4-wheel drive
vehicle you may be able to pull away from that
stop sign or red light faster but when it comes
to emergency stopping, your vehicle will
respond the same as everybody else's! So, let's
be a safe and cautious driver this winter season.

I would like to take a moment to remind everyone to have a safe and happy season......

- While putting up the lights both inside and on the tree, check to make sure they are in good condition. Check for bare wires and missing bulbs. Be aware of how many sets you are connecting; you do not want to overload the circuit.
- Be careful where you run extension cords. You do not want to run an extension cord under a rug or through any doorways; they may crimp or become damaged with the closing of the door.
- If you have a live tree, remember to keep it watered.
- Watch the use of candles. Do not leave them burning unattended.
- Test your smoke detectors to make sure they are working.

SNOW REMOVAL/ PARKING BAN


Snow removal is vital to safe driving. After a snowfall of two inches (2") or more, it is unlawful to park any vehicle, or to permit any vehicle to remain parked on the street until the snow has been removed, and provided that the snowfall has stopped.

Observe "NO PARKING AFTER 2"

SNOWFALL/TOW-AWAY ZONE" signs. The NO PARKING ban WILL be enforced! Cars parked illegally WILL be subject to tow. The Public Works crew works long and hard to keep the Village streets clear and safe. We need and appreciate your cooperation.

Please avoid being subjected to a parking ticket fine and then the additional costs of towing this winter season. Obey the snow removal parking ban.

SHOVELING/SNOW BLOWING



Also, during major, wet snowfalls (only), public works will push aside furrows at the end of driveways which were caused by previous snow plow runs.



SNOW REMOVAL ASSISTANCE

Public Works offers snow removal to senior citizens who are disabled, handicapped and/or have severe health problems and have no one else who is able to help them with snow removal. The public works crew will make one shovel width pass from the street to the front door thus providing exit route in an emergency situation. This work will be done *after* all the roads have been cleared first, followed by end of driveways, and then eligible senior sidewalks. Those in need of snow removal must complete an application available at the Village Office.

Sidewalk Snow Removal

Thanks to Village President Nancy L. Miller and the Village Board, Public Works will be cleaning Village sidewalks with our newly purchased bobcat for all of our residents. Please note that this will take place after the duration of a measurable snowfall. Please be aware of vehicles blocking the sidewalk as clearing a path may not be feasible.

WINTERIZE YOUR WATER PIPES

Frozen water pipes are not life-threatening; however, frozen or broken water pipes do cause damage to homes each winter. If pipes in the walls aren't properly insulated, they can freeze and rupture. An eighth-of-an-inch crack in a pipe can release up to 250 gallons of water a day, soaking floors, rugs, and furniture. To prevent the mess and aggravation frozen pipes cause, protect your home by following these simple steps:

BEFORE COLD WEATHER

Locate and insulate pipes most susceptible to freezing – typically those near outer walls, in crawl spaces, or in the attic. Wrap pipes with heat tape (UL approved). Seal any leaks that allow cold air inside where pipes are located.

Disconnect garden hoses, shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets.

GARBAGE CANS


In the event of snow, please do not place garbage/recycling cans in the street.

WHEN IT'S COLD

Open cabinet doors to allow heat to get at uninsulated pipes under a sink or appliance near an outer wall.

Make sure heat is left on and set no lower than 55 degrees.

If you plan to be away short term, have someone check your house daily to make sure the heat is on to prevent freezing. For a prolonged period of time, drain and shut off the water system (except indoor sprinkling systems).



IF PIPES FREEZE

Make sure you and your family know how to shut off the water if pipes freeze to minimize damage. Call a plumber and contact your insurance agent.

Never attempt to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch.

Always be careful of the potential for electric shock in and around standing water.




